**West 65th Street, between Broadway
and Amsterdam Avenue (Map 10)**

Lincoln Center Theater is expanding in one of the few places left in Lincoln Center: its roof. A 23,000-square-foot two-story addition atop the Eero Saarinen–designed Vivian Beaumont Theater will house the Claire Tow Theater and other spaces for LCT3, its initiative devoted to a new generation of theater. LOUIS ARMSTRONG HOUSE MUSEUM VISITOR CENTER

CAPLES JEFFERSON ARCHITECTS

107th Street, between 34th and 37th Avenues, Queens (Map 21)

Exhibition and performance areas will be located in a new building across the street from the Louis Armstrong House Museum, Satchmo's home in the Corona neighborhood from 1943 until his death in 1971. PARK51

SOMA ARCHITECTS

**51 Park Avenue, between Church Street
and West Broadway (Map 1)**

The most controversial project in New York City in 2010 (along with 15 Penn Plaza), this cultural and recreation center two blocks from the WTC site infuriated people for its incorporation of a room for Muslim prayer in the building's lower floors. Diagonal lines crisscross the façade in varying widths, subtly expressing the various spaces behind. SOMA
